

Editorial

As we have just celebrated Halloween and are about to experience Bonfire night, I thought it might be appropriate to have a look into the origins of both these events. Halloween goes back to Celtic times (with a celebration called Samhain which marked the transition from Summer to Winter, when they believed souls returned to their homes. Christians celebrate All Hallows Day (all Saints' Day) on the 1st of November. So, the 31st of October is All Hallows Eve.

I always thought 'Trick or Treating' originated in America, but apparently not. It goes back to the 16th century in Scotland and Ireland where people went from door to door, dressed in costume, doing tricks and rhyme for something sweet to eat. The custom became popular in the USA in the 1950s, but had been around in America since the 1920's. (*All info. so far courtesy of my search engine*).



Although I don't remember doing much Trick or Treating with my children, my son and granddaughter are really into it, and my son has made some "gravestones" from wood to put in his garden to scare the local children this year (in the best possible taste). My granddaughter also gets her mum to make a special outfit for the occasion, and she and her friends greatly enjoy the event (usually accompanied by some willing parents).

We are all familiar with the origins of Bonfire Night and Guy Fawkes who was born in 1570 in Stonegate, York. He, along with a group of other Catholics led by Robert Catesby, plotted to assassinate King James the 1st of England and replace him with a Catholic monarch. Fawkes was discovered with explosives under the Houses of Parliament and apprehended. Following the round up of all the men involved, Parliament allowed the people to celebrate the King's escape by building a bonfire, if it was done safely, and the tradition still lives on today.

This year Hellifield House are holding a joint Halloween / Bonfire event on the 2^{nd} of November, so why not go along and keep up the tradition?

Julie produced several dishes (a recipe is shared below) whilst chatting nonstop about living on a farm, taking in B&B guests and running a holiday cottage. This was a very entertaining and well-attended afternoon, and we were all treated to beautiful coffee cake at the interval. Julie for many years has been involved in the WI catering for the Yorkshire Show and is looking for additional volunteers for next year already. Sadly, many of us - including me - seem to be too busy to give our time to the wider WI events, but perhaps something to think about.

Our next Hellifield WI speaker is John Dawson of Bleakbank Farm and TV fame. John is always funny and as well as giving an insight into modern day farming, with all its trials and tribulations, keeps up the banter and jokes throughout.

As always, this meeting is open to other WIs and the general public, so if you have an interest in farming, or just want to hear a very good speaker, please come along and support the WI and John. After all, there is nothing worse than speaking to a small audience.

Our November meeting is at 7.15pm on Thursday the 21st at Hellifield Village Hall. Entry for guests is $\pounds 4$. Male and female visitors always welcome, so gentlemen, don't be shy!

Roasted Vegetable Plait Ingredients:

- 12oz mixed vegetables
- olive oil
- 1 chopped onion
- 1 chopped garlic clove
- small can tomatoes
- 2oz gruyere cheese grated
- 4oz mascarpone cheese
- Cream
- 2 tbsp chopped chives
- 1 packet rolled puff pastry
- 1 egg beaten

Method: Put chopped vegetables in dish and sprinkle on olive oil and cook in oven at 200 degrees until soft. Fry onion, garlic & tomatoes until reduced and thickened, then add vegetables to this and season.

In a small bowl, mix half grated cheese with mascarpone, a small amount of cream and the chives and combine. Place pastry on greased baking tray and put vegetable filling in the centre and cover with cheese mixture leaving space for plaits.

Brush pastry with egg and cut diagonal strips in pastry round the edge and fold pastry strips over into a plait shape. Brush with egg and scatter on remaining cheese and black pepper.

Bake at 220 degrees for 30 minutes.

This can be frozen prior to final baking stage if required.

Hellifield speed monitoring

Further to our article in April, the Hellifield CSW Team has continued to carry out monitoring of traffic through our village, working from all our NY Police approved sites: by the village School, St Aidan's Church, the sub-station near the railway bridge and on Gisburn Road. Thankfully, we have noticed a reduction in speed limit excesses, although traffic volumes are up - as would be expected with all the summery weather that we had in June, July and August!

Our current concerns are with the volumes of HGV and tractors travelling through the village. Although there were reductions in freight train volumes on the Carlisle to Skipton route earlier in the year, restrictions have now been lifted by Network Rail. Hopefully, this may have an effect, but with people now expecting to receive goods ordered on-line within a day, freight trains can't facilitate this. (Who remembers the earlier, overnight Mail Delivery trains?) Traffic volumes on the A65 will only continue to increase, so all of us just need to appreciate other road users and the presence of pedestrians more.

We have received our first lot of traffic data from having the VAS radar being located adjacent to the School and this has been passed to the NY Police Community Speed Watch Team. Our own analysis of the data shows that there has been greater compliance to the signed speed limits at this end of the village, which is beneficial to the pupils and staff. However, we do still get the occasional driver doing over 60mph and 20% of all drivers exceed the signed speed limit. This is a concern, as lines of sight at the west end of Hellifield are less than they are by the Church.

Donations to the VAS savings account have now allowed us to request the Parish Council to place a further order with Swarco Traffic UK to buy another moveable VAS radar. This radar will allow us to be more flexible and consistent in our monitoring of traffic at both ends of the village and also on Gisburn Road. NYC (Highways) have now installed the new mounting post on Gisburn Road, since getting the order from our Council.

Certain concerns have been expressed in the village about our authority to carry out vehicle speed monitoring. Hellifield, Long Preston and Gargrave all have NY Police authorized volunteers to carry out Community Speed Watch sessions, at approved sites in their villages. If anybody has such concerns, they should speak to their local councilors, or the Police. The volunteers carrying out traffic monitoring have no powers of jurisdiction. We only pass our recordings onto NY Police for their attention.

Finally, I would like to thank everybody who helped to run our Coffee Morning (see the next page) on the 14th of September, as well as those who provided raffle prizes, made kind donations, or just ate the Kit-Kats! We raised over £302.00 with your generous support. Thank you all.

Local rail and bus conversation

Hello, my name is Jean, although I'm better known as Bunty to most Hellifield residents. I moved to Long Preston in February this year. I hadn't moved far as I was living in Hellifield. At around the same time I moved, changes were made to our local bus company run by Kirby Lonsdale Coach Hire Company.

Since these changes, which regular bus passengers will know about, there have been concerns about the change of company management.

Hearing of friends' and other passengers' experiences, we decided to set up a group with the objective of having a voice to improve communication with the bus company. It also brought up other issues, such as the 2 hourly Saturday service and no Sunday or bank holiday service. This was something of a concern to many people and how it affects them. Also suggested was having a late-night service and better facilities for people who are disabled or with mobility problems. For example: raised bus stop kerbs for wheelchair users.

Some of you will be aware of the Yorkshire Dales explorer train, which runs through to Rochdale and runs up to Ribblehead twice a day on a Saturday. Hopefully, if people use the service it could lead to a regular, daily service in the future.

So, if you would like to become involved, or you have constructive ideas on the service that you need, or anything that comes to mind that would enable/encourage you to use the buses more, here's your opportunity.

The majority of drivers are fantastic, so it's not complaints about them but about getting the company to work with us for the benefit of all.



Remembering one of Hellifield's fallen from the second world war

As we approach Remembrance Sunday, I thought it appropriate to remember one of Hellifield's fallen from this conflict: 3060272 Private James Robert Rumney of the First Battalion, The Gordon Highlanders.

James Robert Rumney was born in 1918, the second son of Robert and Clara Rumney. The family ran a butcher's shop located at the at the end of a row of cottages known as the Fold on the main road next to the Temperance Hotel. The long-demolished shop is shown in the photograph opposite. James had three siblings, George b.1915, Mary b.1919 and Marjorie b.1925. All helped out in the family business.

James enlisted with the Gordon Highlanders in 1940 and was sent with his regiment to North Africa where he took part in the battle of El Alamein and the later campaigns in Tunisia. After the surrender of the Axis forces in North Africa on 13th May 1943, the battalion took part in "Operation Husky", the invasion of Sicily. After 38 days of hard fighting Sicily was safely in allied hands and the first battalion was withdrawn back to England to prepare and train for the invasion of Normandy (D-Day) .

The first battalion Gordon Highlanders landed on Juno Beach on the afternoon of the 6th June 1944 after the beachhead had been established and were immediately despatched to relieve the Airborne forces who had been holding nearby Bénouville Bridge (later renamed Pegasus Bridge) for

over six hours before the first amphibious landings took place. At some point during the Normandy campaign James sustained wounds to one of his hands and was returned to England where he spent some time in Pinderfields Hospital Wakefield as shown in the attached newspaper cutting. James returned to his battalion in August 1944 and took part in the breakout from Normandy and the campaigns in Belgium and Holland before entering Germany and eventually crossing the Rhine in March 1945. On the 1st May 1945 the battalion took part in the assault on the village of Bremervorde in Lower Saxony. This would turn out to be the battalion's last action of the war. Sadly, James was to lose his life two days later, aged 27 years old, and only one day before the German forces in the west surrendered unconditionally to Field Marshal Sir Bernard Montgomery on nearby Lüneburg Heath. The surrender preceded the end of World War two in Europe on the 8th May 1945.

James is buried at Becklingen War Cemetery on Lüneburg Heath, Germany, his headstone is shown in the attached photograph. He is also

remembered on Hellifield St. Aidan's war memorial.

View from the Vicarage

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them. ('For the Fallen' - Laurence Binyon)

More poetry from me this month, but very different from Keats' wistful reflections on autumn in the October magazine.

Binyon's words will be read across the country at around 11am on Remembrance Sunday (November 10th) including at the war memorials in our village. I hope as many of our readers as possible will be able to attend our Act of Remembrance from 10.50am at the memorial and continuing immediately afterwards in St Aidan's. It will be, I'm sure, and as always, a profound and moving occasion.

But did you know that, unlike much of the famous poetry of WW1, Binyon's 'For the Fallen' was written within just a few weeks of hostilities breaking out? On reflection, it's a deeply sobering thought, as Binyon's biographer has noted: 'In its gravitas, its tenderness, and depth of grief, "For the Fallen" looks as if it should have appeared in The Times of 21 September 1918 not 1914.' The heavy casualties in the first weeks of World War 1 were, of course, as nothing compared to the nightmarish toll that had accumulated four years later. It's one of the appalling ironies of modern human history that the so-called 'war to end all wars' in fact laid the foundations, in many ways, for the even worse conflict that was to follow twenty years on.

There's been much talk recently in the serious press - appropriately so, I think-

about the ability of our country to deal with hostile acts from groups and nations across the world. Much of the discussion has been pessimistic and, like so much of the news in the last few years, likely to make us very depressed if we ponder it without recourse also to something lighter and more cheerful! But in our 'season of Remembrance', I think we're called to give thanks ever more devotedly for those whose names are on our war memorial, and the millions like them who gave up their lives so that our nation might be free from tyranny and oppression.

Very few survivors now remain even from World War 2, whilst veterans of more recent overseas conflicts in the Falklands, the Gulf and Afghanistan face perhaps now a rather muted appreciation of their sacrifices from today's media and politicians. War is atrocious and, Christians have always said, should only ever be pursued to protect the innocent and vulnerable. Amidst so many distractions - and let's face it, many of those distractions are trivial in comparison - can we make time on November 10th to remember those immortalised by Laurence Binyon but who, over the course of the next four years, were destined to be joined by an unthinkable multitude of others?

North Craven Flower Club

Sometimes the best arrangements are made in items that you may have around your home and garden. An old vase you inherited from your Granny, your favourite teapot or in this case, a garden riddle or sieve!

This arrangement idea appeared in the Flower Arranger magazine in the summer edition in 2021. It uses an old garden riddle and test tubes that have been inserted into the wire of the riddle. These are then filled with water and flowers and greenery from the garden. The test tubes can be held more firmly with Oasis Fix which is a cross between plasticine and Blu Tac but is also waterproof and ideal for holding mechanics in place in or out of water.

The Flower Arranger magazine is published four times a year and has lots of suggestions for floral arrangements as well as tips for conditioning flowers and flowers/shrubs to grow in your garden to make flower arranging a little less expensive. This is a wonderful shop - an Aladdin's cave. Do go and explore it, especially if you are looking for a special present, maybe for a youngster for Christmas. We are so lucky to have so many independent local shops to support.

I am also very grateful to Sheila Metcalfe who has enhanced many articles with her beautiful crochet work. She always seems able to turn some very basic knitting into something attractive. Such a talented lady.

At present I have two adult scarves to sell - one is purple and white, the other is orange and brown. Someone might like them, perhaps for a gift. All proceeds go to the Smile Train.



Looking for a workout class that meets you where you are and builds on that? In my humble opinion, Jo Holroyde's (formerly Elsmore until her spectacular wedding to Pete in September) really wonderful Kettlebells class is the thing.
